Winter is a great time to get on the air and propagation has been better than recent years. In spite of most activity being on FT8, there are still plenty of QSO's to be had using SSB and CW. Seventeen and 15 meters are open daily now, and it is not unusual to find activity on 12 meters many days. This is just the start of the upswing of the new solar cycle; things will slowing improve for a few years.

Last weekend was the ARRL January VHF contest, and there was a fair amount of local activity, even if the majority of it was on FT8. I missed it, but I hear there was plenty of Sporadic E on 6 meters on Saturday. Last Saturday was also the January edition of the NAQP CW and the bands were busy with plenty of non-FT8 activity for it.

I have been staying in for the past several weeks. COVID made an appearance at our house. I am still on the mend; but it was not a serious case and I did not want to expose anyone else. The new positive tests are at an all-time high, and hospital beds are in short supply in area hospitals. It may be prudent of us to not meet in person the next couple of months; look for that decision to be made soon.

The February meeting is scheduled for Wednesday February 2, place still to be determined. If we do not meet in person, we will again use Zoom to conduct our business meeting.

Moved and Seconded: Minutes of the January 22 WIARC Meeting

The January 2022 meeting of the Western Illinois ARC was called held at Twin Oaks Club in Quincy on January 5, 2022. The meeting was called to order at 7 pm by Vice-President W9WE in the absence of W9DP.

The following were present: W9WE, K9VXD, KB9FIN, WB9EWM, WA9GBC, KD0DKE, KB9TVM, W9GQK, W9EMR, KD9NET and N9JF AND via Zoom: NB4C, N9QJW, K9AJC and visitor N9QJW.

Minutes of the December 2021 meeting were approved as printed in <u>*The Feedline*</u> on a motion by WB9EWM, seconded by KB9FIN and carried.

Treasurer's Report: K9VXD reported that 51 of the approximately 80 members on last year's roster have renewed so are. DUES ARE DUE. Individuals who have not paid dues by April 1, 2022 will be dropped from the roster.

Expenditures approved for repeater equipment at the December meeting have been paid to the total of \$1841.46.

Interest income from CD's for 2021 was received in the amount of \$166. Two CD's are rolling over shortly. Total income for 2021 was \$1493.49, total expenditures \$1135.20 for a net gain (January 1, 2021 to January 1, 2022: \$358.29.

The treasurer's report was approved on a motion by KB9FIN, seconded by WB9EWM and carried on voice vote.

Repeater Board report by WB9EWM: Repeater Board members WB9EWM, NR9Q and KD0DKE met at the channel 7 site on December 27. They removed the Quintron unit, receiver and S-Comm unit leaving the Fusion repeater and duplexer. SWR was checked and satisfactory on all feedlines. New equipment will be installed at the .03 site. There is a problem with one of the cavities in the duplexer and it was temporarily taken out of line. The committee will install a new PA, power supply and cables. Contact info will be provided to personnel at both Channel 7 and Channel 10. We need copies of the club FCC license to post at the repeater site. KB9FIN moved, seconded by W9EMR and carried that at least two copies be procured. The committee is trying to consolidate and clean up equipment as much as possible at the .03 site as channels 7 and 10 are going to both be located at the .03 site in the future.

The Channel 10 tower is going to be taken down. We will need to retrieve our .94 antenna when this happens. There was discussion about the possibility of moving .94 to the Adams County tower rather than to have all of the operating repeaters on the Channel 7 tower.

The Repeater Board is recommending that the club's D-Star equipment (which is not currently in service) be sold. This action is pending discussion and decision by the club membership. Members are encouraged to share opinions with the Repeater Board ASAP.

W9GQK reported that what appears to be malicious interference has been occurring on both the .03 and .94 repeaters. Attempts will be made to DF the source.

Club Station: no report

Contest Committee: Upcoming contests in January include ARRL RTTY Roundup, NAQP (both CW and SSB), and CQ 160 CW.

Old Business: none

Applications for Membership: none

New Business: The upcoming VE schedule is on the club website.

K9VXD is suggesting that Treasurer records ongoing be digitized as storing paper copies is getting to be an issue.

WB9EWM moved, seconded by KB9FIN and carried that the practice of issuing membership cards be resumed. NB4C mentioned that the club in Florida does issue such cards but that only about 20% of the membership request them. WA9GBC showed the cards that are issued for Twin Oaks Club.
